PIERCE, John Baptist, 1875-1942, Alabama born, Brickmason experience with father in youth. Tuskegee Inst. CUT grad. Taught in classroom and trades, High Point, No. Car. At Hampton Inst., began study for life's work Oct. 5, 1889; received certificate in ag. in 1902. Dr. Seamon A. Knapp in his 1907 report to Sec. Ag. James Wilson, attributed the beginnings of "demonstration work" for Negro farmers to Dr. H. B. Frissell, Pres. of Hampton Inst., and to Dr. Booker T. Washington, President of Tuskegee Inst.; and Sec. Ag. Claude/Wickard has attributed the fine characteristics exhibited by Mr. Pierce of *patience, perseverance, patience, tact and cooperativeness," during his 35 years of work with Negro farmers and their families, to his association with these great leaders. Slogans of the early days included: LIVE ON YOUR FARM AND BOARD AT HOME. Mr. Pierce was so successful in carrying this "live at home" program into effect, first as county agent, then as district agent, and finally as regional field agent in nine states, working out from Hampton as his base, that he was held in high esteem by both races. This record is based on data from Secretary Wickard and other sources sent me, with a photograph for the cut, by Field Agent John W. Mitchell; and on my own firsthand observation of this good and great man in action, both

at Hampton and in the field.
