U. S. D. A. Office of Exp. Stations: Asst., 1901-1908; Head Ag. Ed. Service, 1908-1913. Cornell Univ., Prof. Ag. Ext. Teaching, a notable "first," and part-time farmer, 1913-1915. With his U.S. D. A. Chief, Dr. A. C. True, rendered unique service in research, writing, and speech, to and through Com. on Instr. in Ag. of Am. Assoc. Ag. Colleges and Exp. Stattions. Approved ag. schools, separate or at ag. colleges, as in Ala., Cal., Minn., or Wis.; and helped set up ag. curriculum for Ga. Congressional District Schools. But, in 1902, helped lead Com. to declare: ".... the teaching of ag. should be introduced into the public high schools in or near rural communities." Soon, 1907-, he held public school ag. should not be "narrowly vocational," but should "fit for life....as citizens....as well as farmers and horticulturists." Finally, at 1910 Convention, and thereafter in print and person, he advocated supervised home projects during vacations; and argued that opportunity should be opened for capable ag. course graduates to enter regular ag. col. courses. One of the first and ablest proponents, nationwide, 1901-1913, of agricultural education in the public schools. -- C. H. Lane and R. W. Stimson.
