HILTON, Arthur Robert, 1882- Born into farming family in Clarendon, South Australia. Irked in youth by primitive methods. Sought education to upgrade farm life and labor. At Teachers' College and Adelaide University, 1901-1907. Taught CUT rural school. On honeymoon in England, studied school agriculture and nature study, 1912. Convinced rural schools at home needed like education. So reported. As a result he was put in charge of Murray Bridge High School near Victoria, and established there school gardens and related courses suited to local conditions. He heard of our "Earning and Learning" or "School and Home Farm Cooperation" philosophy and methods; studied them in print, including my "picture book"
"Vocational Agricultural Education by Home Projects; and came on a Carnegie Scholarship to study them in action, 1929. Bought a car in San Francisco. Studied our system in 14 states. Spent last month in Massachusetts. Returned via Canada. Back home again, he was given the task of introducing our type of education in vocational agriculture into South Australia high schools, 1930- In charge of Urrbras Agricultural High School center, 1932-Fuller details in PART SIX of his outstanding contributions to education for agricultural careers in his country.
