Teacher trainer at Univ. of Minn., 1921-1929. Since 1929, Specialist in Ag. Ed. (Research), U. S. Office of Education. Major objective: to improve ag. ed. by research, with particular regard to establishment of young men in profitable farming and as worthy citizens in their communities. Secretary of National Committee on Standards for Voc. Ed. in Ag. Represented U. S. Office of Education in Victory Farm Volunteer Program. Assistance in compiling U. S. Office of Education "Hist. Ag. Ed....." invaluable. In all public duties, wise, watchful, and tireless. Generous. Appreciative. Known and respected, coast to coast, for his alert support of high endeavor and for his professional integrity. — Rufus W. Stimson.



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
