PROSSER, Charles Allen, 1871- Of Welsh and Pennsylvania Dutch ancestry. A.B. A.M., Ph. D., Honorary D. So., D. Ped., LL.D. Titled the "Father of public voc. ed." First Asst. Commissioner for voc. ed. in Mass. First full-time Secretary, Nat. Soc. for Industrial Ed., now A.V.A. First CUT Fed Bd. for Voc. Ed. Director. Under him Federally aided voc. ed. sprang into action, coast to coast, 1917- In 1910, at table elbow to elbow with "School and Home Farm Cooperation" program originator, checked and approved first job or project analysis published. Put "supervised farm practice" into Smith-Hughes Act. He has said of another: "To the movement for efficient training in agriculture .... (he) has probably contributed more than any other single man ..... we never keers really learn anything except by doing. We learn to do practical things by practicing them and we learn to do them more intelligently by thinking in connection with that practice. Dr..... recognized this as keenly as Rousseau or John Dewey, and proceeded to apply the principle to ag. ed. "Of himself all this might have been said with greater justice. Always princely in the niceties and amenities of administration. Never, "My agent" or "My supervisor." Instead, "Our agent" or "My colleague." In consequence, a leader dearly loved, highly

honored, and respectfully remembered. A shining example for emulation.
