WALLACE, Henry Agard, 1888 - Vice President, 1941 Secretary of Agriculture, 1933-1940. Grandson of "Uncle" Henry Wallace, early agricultural editor and Farmer's Institute worker in Iowa. Son of Henry C. Wallace, Secretary of Agriculture under Harding and Coolidge. Iowa State College B. S. 1910. Studied agriculture in Europe in 1912. Has Editor of Wallace's Farmer. Wrote "Agricultural Prices" in 1920, "America Must Choose" in 1934, and "The American

Choice" in 1940. Developed corn-hog ratio charts. Experimented with hybrid corn. The agricultural adjustment program, the Soil Conservation Service and the Farm Security Administration were developed under his leadership as secretary of agriculture. Learned to speak Spanish in order to improve relationships with South America. Once stated, "The week is a neighborhood. We have learned that . . . the jobless in India are related to the unemployed here." Also said that the doctrine of the struggle for existence is outmoded and should be replaced by the higher law of cooperation. An apostle of the "Ever-Normal Granary" and of The property of the prop
