WARE, Charlotte Barrell, 1868- Mass. born and educated. Boston Univ., A.B., 1885; D. Humanities (hon.), 1937. Cut from Married Robert Allison Ware, 1895. He had inherited part of ancestral acres and the "new house" built in glossy print from 1679/; and she had as a wedding gift a St. Lambert strain Jersey heifer calf. In Paris in 1904, she was served favorite photo. milk in an individual bottle. This reopened an old diseus cussion, which he ended thus: "You've always wanted to be a farmer. Why not begin now?" Warelands, at Highland Lake, Norfolk, Mass., soon became internationally famous, 1909-1913, as the seat of Warelands Dairy School, organized, directed, and supported by her, to train women for dairying, and to protect the public, particularly children, against dirty and disease carrying milk; at a crisis whien typhoid epidemics had become rampant. Maught Had caught the land-grant college spirit during family visits at the Vermont and Washington, D.C., homes of Senator Justin S. Morrill. Ardent supporter of the Theodore Roosevelt "Country Life Commission." A pioneer promoter of school and home gardening. With Mrs. Charles Sumner Bird, called the first meeting which led to the establishment of Norfolk County Agricultural School with its ke vocational education and extension service teamwork program, 1916- Chairman, International Cooperation Committee, Woman's National Farm and Garden Association. Trustee, Albanian-American School of Ag., Kavege, Albania, a Near East Foundation affiliate. Sent by U.S.D.A. Sec.Ag., H. C. Walkace, on "Special Mission" to In-ternational Inst. Ag., Rome, 1922. Received Belgian medals for hu-manitarian service through "clean milk;" and Mass. Dept. Ag. gold medal, 1929, with a citation titled: "A Pioneer Who Has Blazed Many An Agricultural Trail." Distinguished. Gracious. Unstinting in her public service to education for superior farming careers. -- R. W. Stimson.



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
