MOTON, ROBERT RUSSA, 1867-1940. Graduated Hampton Institute, 1890. LLD: Virginia Union University, 1916; Wilberforce University, 1916; Oberlin, 1916; Williams, 1920; Howard, 1930. Lit.D: Lincoln University (^{Pa.} Pennsylvania), 1920, Hon. M. A., Howard, 1929. Comdt., Hampton, 1890-1916. Succeeded Booker T. Washington as Principal, Tuskegee, 1915. Directed Hampton-Tuskegee \$5,000,000.00 Endowment Campaign. Co-founder Commission on Inter-racial Cooperation. Special Service Officer Negro Troops in World War I. Chairman, Committee, Education to Haiti. Speaker, Unveiling Lincoln Memorial. Accompanied Booker Washington on and continued "Goodwill Tours". Insisted on all-Negro personnel, Tuskegee, U. S. Veterans Facility. While Principal, continued and implemented Dr. Washington's varied enterprises. Had profound effect upon Industrial Education and inter-racial cooperation. Harmon Award in Race Relations, 1930. Spingarn Medal, 1932. Wrote: "Racial Goodwill", 1916; "Find a Way Out" (autobiography), 1920; "What the Negro Thinks", 1929. Educator; Promotor of Interracial Cooperation; Fund Raiser.
