 operations of the farm. More than any other man, he shaped the found-
 ing and destiny of Storrs Ag. School, "for the education of boys....
 to insure their proficiency in the business of agriculture," which de-
 veloped into the Connecticut Ag. College then into the University of
 Connecticut, and whose ~~traditions~~ aims he championed as a
 trustee for 20 years. At the "Washington conventions" in 1882, 1883,
 and 1885, he was among those ~~prominent~~ prominent in ag. ed. and research
 from many States. One time editor, he for two generations was a frequent
 contributor to the ag. press. In speech, as in print, he was ready and
 forceful. Always a student, his knowledge was wide and varied. Withal,
 he was an "excellent practical farmer." By nature kindly, he was as loved
 as he was respected. More than 60 years he was a leader in every move-
 ment for the betterment of Connecticut agriculture and ~~its~~ ~~education~~
~~widely~~ widely known and influential as its Nestor in
